The Later Tudors Penry Williams 1995 The *Later Tudors*, the second volume to be published in Oxford's authoritative series *The New Oxford History of England*, tells the story of England between the accession of Edward VI and the death of Elizabeth I. The second half of the sixteenth century was a period of intense conflict between the nations of Europe, and between competing Catholic and Protestant beliefs. These struggles produced acute anxiety in England, but the nation was saved from the disasters that befell her neighbors and, by the end of Elizabeth's reign, achieved a remarkable sense of political and religious identity. He begins by weaving together the political, religious, and economic history of the nation, setting out the workings and development of the English state.
